Council Executive Message

Thank you for your continued support of our youth, communities, and the Scouting program. Your support ensures our ability to deliver the nation's foremost youth development program to our local communities. Our primary focus has always been, and will always be, to serve America's youth in a safe environment by providing the best program possible.

On July 27, 2015, the Boy Scouts of America National Executive Board ratified a resolution that removes the national restriction on openly gay adult leaders and employees. The resolution is effective immediately. Of those present and voting, 79 percent voted in favor of the resolution.

Chartered organizations will continue to select their adult leaders and religious chartered organizations may continue to use religious beliefs as criteria for selecting adult leaders, including matters of sexuality. This change allows Scouting's members and parents to select local units, chartered to organizations with similar beliefs, that best meet the needs of their families. This change also respects the right of religious chartered organizations to choose adult volunteer leaders whose beliefs are consistent with their own.



Why The Change Was Made:

During the 2015 Boy Scouts of America National Annual Meeting in May, Dr. Gates encouraged the Scouting family to reflect on the challenges, primarily regarding adult leadership standards, facing the BSA and potential alternatives for addressing them. Dr. Gates' remarks can be found on Scouting Newsroom.

- The BSA faces the prospect of litigation in multiple states in the very near future. Legal counsel has advised national leadership that the likelihood of being able to defend the policy going forward is very low. Due to the social, political, and legal changes taking place in our country and in our movement, the past adult leadership policy could not be sustained.
- The best way to allow the BSA to continue to focus on its mission and preserve its core values was to address the issue and set its own course to ensure it continues to provide life-changing experiences to youth they cannot get anywhere else.

Why This Resolution Is Right For Scouting:

The BSA National Executive Board voted to ratify a resolution amending the adult leadership standards. The resolution was unanimously recommended by those present and voting for ratification by the National Executive Committee earlier this month.

Effective immediately, chartered organizations are able to select adult volunteer leaders without regard to sexual orientation, continuing Scouting's longstanding policy of chartered organizations selecting their leaders. The 2013 youth membership policy is not affected and remains unchanged.

This change allows Scouting's members and parents to select local units, chartered to organizations with similar beliefs, that best meet the needs of their families. This change also respects the right of religious chartered organizations to choose adult volunteer leaders whose beliefs are consistent with their own.

It remains the position of the BSA that the ideals and principles of "duty to God" and "a Scout is reverent" set forth in the Scout Oath and Scout Law are central to teaching young people to make better choices over their lifetimes.

Focusing on Scouting's Mission:

Scouting is not an appropriate environment to discuss sexual conduct, and the BSA will continue to have a strict behavioral standard for its youth members and adult leaders.

Since 1910, the BSA has relied on chartered organizations to oversee and deliver the Scouting program in local communities. Nationally, Scouting represents approximately 2.4 million youth members and nearly 1 million adult leaders with diverse beliefs. Scouting teaches its youth members and adult leaders to be tolerant and respectful of different religious and moral beliefs, acknowledging that reasonable minds may honorably differ.

Moving forward, Scouting will continue to focus on reaching and serving youth, helping them grow into good, strong citizens. By focusing on the goals that unite us, we are able to accomplish incredible things for young people and the communities we serve.

What It Means

For the BSA: Scouting is not an appropriate environment to discuss sexual conduct. While there is no national or local council restriction on openly gay adults serving as leaders or employees, everyone agrees to follow national policies and comply with the BSA's behavioral standards.

For Youth: Scouting is a youth program and no youth may be denied membership in the Boy Scouts of America on the basis of sexual orientation or preference.

For Families: Parents can select units, chartered to organizations with similar beliefs, that best meet the needs of their families.

For Adult Leaders: Unit leaders may apply for positions in units chartered to organizations with similar beliefs. At the district level and above, there is no restriction on openly gay adults serving as leaders.

For Chartered Organizations: They will continue to select adult leaders, and religious chartered organizations may use religious beliefs as criteria for selecting adult leaders, including matters of sexuality.

By addressing this issue, the BSA is now able to continue to focus on its mission, preserve its core values, and provide life-changing experiences to youth they cannot get anywhere else.

Moving forward, we will continue to focus on reaching and serving youth, helping them grow into good, strong citizens. By focusing on the goals that unite us, we are able to accomplish incredible things for young people and the communities we serve. [Submitted by Carlos Cortez]

Dear Fellow Scouts, Leaders and Families:


Summer is in full swing with our Scouts at summer camp as well as on a variety of outdoor activities such as backpacking, hiking, canoe, kayak adventures and so on.

The goal in all of these activities is to create memorable and long-lasting positive experiences for our youth.

I know I mentioned in my last message about the many changes happening in Scouting. Membership policy standards will again take front and center stage allowing the same courtesies to adults as we have provided for our youth. Dr. Gates mentioned that the current policies were unsustainable and therefore Scouting leadership must act prudently and in a timely fashion with the overall best interests of our Scouts and the Scouting movement.

It will now be up to our Chartered Organizations (Unit owners) to decide the unit leadership chemistry and not BSA National. This is a new approach for protecting the foundation of our Scouting movement as well as the Aims and Methods.

When I was a Scout back in the 70's I loved being a Cub Scout, hanging around my friends and doing fun things. This is Scouting! When I bridged, my Boy Scout Troop was not as organized and some of the boys in the troop bullied me, making it uncomfortable to focus on learning all the Scouting ways and earn merit badges. Troop 20 in Topanga Canyon



California is no longer around but many of the Scouts from that troop have gone on to do some really great things. By staying the course and learning how to work things out I'm still very close to my SPL. Today he and I still stay in close contact and meet from time to time.

The reason why I mentioned my experience is that I think that there are Scouts who have had the same experience or are experiencing that frustration right now. Don't be concerned or worried, interacting with our adult leadership and being able to work through these experiences may be the most important lesson in your life. Scouting mirrors life. In life, in our jobs, and in general, we will experience the same interactions. Please never quit or give up. There may be a positive lesson that could change your life for the best.

As President of your Council, I have had a variety of experiences that have made me into the person I am today. If I would have given up on the trail during a backpacking trip or not finished a merit badge, or not showed up to support my fellow Scouts I would not be the person capable of leading the Los Padres Council.

Finally, my excitement and thoughts go out to all of our Arrowmen who are traveling to the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC) 100th Anniversary in Michigan. May their trip be safe and enjoyable with many great stories and memories to share.

Council Commissioner Corner

We are over halfway through the current Scouting year. Have you conducted a checkup of your unit's progress towards Journey to Excellence (JTE) for this year? Every unit should have a copy of the 2015 Journey to Excellence Score Card. If you have a Commissioner working with your unit, hopefully he/she has been discussing your unit's progress towards JTE. If you do not have a Commissioner serving your unit, contact your

District Commissioner and ask him for assistance. Additionally, JTE Score Cards and other resources related to Journey to Excellence can be found online at www.Scouting.org/Home/Commissioners/Journey.aspx. Journey to Excellence is a way to measure your unit's progress in utilizing the Scouting program and at the same time, to receive recognition for doing so.

Has your unit been inputting your service hours? Service hours are part of the Journey to Excellence program as well as being an essential element of what we do in Scouting. Any service project which members of your unit perform should be reported to the Boy Scouts of America. This includes hours conducted during an Eagle project.

Please ensure that Advancement Reports for your units are submitted in a timely manner. This is important for all units, regardless of what program you are in. We have experienced situations in the our Council where an Eagle application is turned in and when we check the young man's Scouting record, there was no record of his advancement or some key elements such as Star, Life and/or required merit badges were missing. These situations could result in dire consequences for the young man and often result in several hours being expended by District/Council level volunteers in an attempt to correct the issue. Merit Badges earned at summer camps in other Councils can especially be a problem. After the summer camp season is over, go online and make sure all your Scouts merit badges earned at summer camp are in their official ScoutNet record. If not, submit an Advancement Report with the appropriate information.

Adult leadership training at summer camps. More and more summer camps are providing adult leadership training. If you have adult volunteers who have completed leadership training at summer camp such as Scoutmaster/Assistant Scoutmaster Position

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Specific Training and/or Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills (IOLS), make sure that training is entered into the Training Manager in My.Scouting.org. You can also ask the Commissioner serving your unit to enter the information as well as Zea Bauer, the Council Registrar. Keep copies of the training completion card(s) in your unit files and provide a copy of the card(s) to either your Commissioner (who will forward the information to the Council Registrar) or directly to the Council Registrar.

We are not far away from the annual re-charter process. The charter packages will be delivered to the District Commissioners on October 1st and 2nd, and the packages should be quickly distributed to the units thereafter. The deadline for the completed charters to be turned in is December 31st. For all practical purposes, the re-charter packages should be turned in no later than Friday, December 18th. There are several things units can be doing in the meantime to prepare for the re-charting process. First, DO NOT hold onto new member registrations, youth or adult, to submit with the charter package. Register them as soon as they join your unit. First issue is insurance coverage. If they are not registered in the BSA, they technically are not insured. Second, in terms of youth, any advancement or merit badges earned prior to being registered are void. So, again, make sure everyone is registered at the time to come on board with their unit. A second area is training. As mentioned in prior newsletters, all registered members of the BSA over the age of 18 must complete the appropriate Youth Protection Training (YPT) on an annual basis. Given this, have your members over the age of 18 complete their YPT training anytime during the current charter year. Do not wait until the last minute to complete YPT. Most problems with processing charter renewal packages deal with adult volunteers not completing YPT in a timely manner. The second training issue is that unit leaders this year must complete the Position Specific Training for their registered positions

before they can reregister. Again, refer to the Training Policy information previously sent out. As a suggestion, in the past, we have encouraged registering Eagle Scouts who have reached the age of 18 as Assistant Scoutmasters. Many of these young men go off to college or the military. Because of the new training requirements, we now encourage you to register these young men as College Scouter Reserve or Scouter Reserve. By doing so, the only training requirement they will need to maintain is YPT. Of course, if the young man is going to stay in the community and is able to complete the required training, register them as an Assistant Scoutmaster. A third area is succession planning. If an adult volunteer is going to change assignments or step down, address the issue as soon as the situation becomes apparent and seek to identify who will be taking that persons place. The second most frequent cause in the delaying of processing charter packages is vacant adult volunteer positions. Finally, do regularly communicate with the Commissioner assigned to work with your unit. Commissioners are trained to assist units in the re-charter process and they have ready access to resources to assist in dealing with issues which may arise during the process. If you do not have a Commissioner serving your unit, contact your District Commissioner. If you cannot connect with your District Commissioner, contact Rick TerBorch, the Council Commissioner.

Pertinent Program Proclamations Big News from Training!

All YPT needs to be done annually. While the certificate does in fact say it is valid for two years, Western Region has directed that all units in the Western Region will recertify all people annually. That means that anyone that hasn't taken YPT in 2015 needs to do that to be able to register for 2016.

A great deal of thought and deliberation went into this decision, and concern for our youth was paramount. They deserve to have the best program we can provide with well-planned, safe and FUN activities. We appreciate our volunteer leaders and the time you freely give to Scouting and we believe that completing the required training will help you learn the methods and resources available to make your job easier as a Scout Leader. 
There are many online training courses and resources available on the BSA website. If you are new to Scouting, you will want to take the orientation courses such as, "**Fast Start**" and


