Rancho Alegre News

Rancho Alegre looks forward to hosting a council Cub Scout Shooting Sports Day on Saturday, February 25. More information on this event is included in the following article.

In addition to this Cub Scout event, our camp will be hosting a large number of weekend activities this winter and spring that range from youth retreats to Boy Scout district camporees. There is plenty of availability, though, for weekend pack, troop, team, and crew camping at the ranch. Interested unit leaders should call Dana Mendoza at (805) 686-5167 to make a reservation.

Plans for Cub Scout and Boy Scout resident camps are now being developed. Boy Scout troops can sign up for camp by completing a site reservation form and paying a \$150 "hold a site" deposit fee. Individual application forms for Cub Scout camp and for Boy Scout provisional campers will be available in January.

One important date change that has been made to our summer program is that National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) has been moved to the week of June 18-24. This is one week later than had originally been planned to avoid a conflict with some school district calendars.

Cub Scout Shooting Sports Day

Cub Scouts are invited to sign-up for Cub Scouts Shooting Sports Day on Saturday, February 25, at Rancho Alegre. There will be both a morning session (9 to Noon) and afternoon session (1 to 4 pm). Activities will consist of bb guns, archery, and sling shots. There is a maximum of 40 Cub Scouts for each session. Cost is \$12.00. Scouts can sign up either individually or as a unit (pack or den). Registration begins one-half hour before the start time above. Registration must be done online at the Council website: www.lpcbsa.org.

Participating Scouts must have a California required Shooting Sports Permission Form which is available online. Scouts attending without a parent or guardian in attendance will need to have the form with them. Otherwise, the parent can complete the form upon arrival at Rancho Alegre.

Parent and leaders -- Please make sure that you do not have a conflict with Little League, Soccer, etc. when signing up for this event.

Some units like to make a day of it incorporating this activity with outdoor advancement requirements. Some units will even come for an overnighter. 2017 Council Annual Dinner

Mark your calendar! Our council annual recognition dinner will be held on Saturday, February 11 from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. at the Santa Maria Country Club (505 W. Waller Lane in Santa Maria).

This event honors all of our great adult volunteers and, in particular, provides an opportunity to recognize two dedicated Scouters with the Silver Beaver Award, the top national award that can be presented by a local council.

Our new council leaders for 2017 will be formally installed that evening and council and district accomplishments over the last year will be highlighted.

The projected cost is \$40 per person and registrations will be open soon through our council website and our local Scout stores.

Summer Camp 2017

Rancho Alegre is the gem of the Los Padres Council. There is plenty to do at this camp



at one of the most reasonable prices in all of California. In fact, our basic prices had a modest \$10 increase from last year. This summer there will be three programs occurring at the camp.

LIFE GUARD ACADEMY: Our Life Guard Academy is a great program for older youth (need to be at least 15, but we train adults as well and you don't even need to be registered in Scouting.) It is a weeklong intensive program that prepares Life Guards for camps, community pools, and special programs. Participants stay in our dormitories and have nutritious, delicious food prepared by our Dining Hall Staff. Dates are June 11-17. Cost is only \$350 (\$325 if registered and paid in full by April 30, 2017.)

BOY SCOUT SUMMER CAMP: Boy Scout

Summer Camp opens on Sunday, July 9, and ends on Saturday, July 15. For Scouts attending with their unit, cost is \$385.00 per youth. Adult leadership is \$230.00 each. however based on the number of youth attendees,



there is sliding scale on no charge payments for some adults.

Provisional Scouts (attendees not attending with their unit and under the supervision of our provided Scoutmaster) are charged \$410. We also have a special rate for Day Campers of only \$355. These Scouts are dropped off each morning and picked up by 5 pm. Breakfast and Lunch provided; and they can stay late on one evening for dinner and program.

Rancho Alegre has a wide variety of programs that cater to the new Scout (Trail to First Class) and Merit Badges in Aquatics, Shooting Sports, Nature, Scoutcraft, Physical Fitness, Health and Safety, and Handicraft. In addition, there is our new Climbing Tower (with Climbing Merit Badge) and COPE Course.

If the drought leaves us with an adequate source of water, we will again offer the Canoeing, Kayaking, and Rowing Merit Badges Our Trail to First Class program has been redesigned to be in compliance with the new requirements which become mandatory on January 1, 2017.

CUB SCOUT RESIDENT CAMP: Our third program is Cub Scouts and Family Resident Camp which runs July 5-8. Rates for this program are \$295 for one adult and one child or \$350 for the entire immediate family. Older siblings needing to work on rank requirements can schedule time in Scoutcraft to demonstrate and get signed off.

Our offering of activities include bb guns, archery, handicrafts, and swimming. Utilizing the current Cub Scout rank advancement requirements, our friendly camp staff will work with Scouts to complete a number of the outdoor activity each of the different ranks. This is a great way for a family to get a mini vacation. And speaking of vacation, our camp theme this year is **Wild, Wild West**.

LPC Service to the Community, July to October 2016

The Fall months are always a busy time for Scouts and Scouters, but a number of units still found time to complete a number of service projects throughout the Council. As reported on the JTE website, 12 units invested a total of nearly 1.000 hours! Del Norte & South Coast districts each had 4 involved units to lead the way. Pack 122 worked 76 hours in August. Conservation was popular, with both Troop 1 & 4 in South Coast putting in nearly 200 hours in that area alone. Cachuma district had Troop 41 & 42 working on Eagle Projects for over 300 hours, plus 8 other service projects completed by Troop 42 for an additional 82 hours! Live Oak was represented by Troop 2103 supporting our military with a 9 hour project plus 4 different Eagle projects totaling 661 hours from Troops 93, 394, 87, & Crew 66. In Camino Real Troops 413 & 26 completed 3 projects each in their local communities. Del Norte had 2 Eagles from Troop 60 and one from Troop 51 finishing their projects. Down in South Coast, Troop 105 had 2 Eagle Scout projects completed for over 600 hours, while Troop 26 also had 2 for an additional 550 hours. Troop 4 scouts assisted their Eagle with over 130 hours. Grand total of hours recorded was very close to 3,500. Some of the Eagle project hours have not yet been posted, as that happens after their Boards of Review are completed. I believe there are probably at least another 1,000 hours in the wings- so to speak...

If you haven't yet put in your unit's service projects that have been completed during this year please be sure to do so as service hours are an essential part of the Journey to Excellence program as well as being a significant part of what we do in Scouting. Any service project which members of your unit perform should be reported to the Boy Scouts of America at:

Remember, only the total number of hours for Eagle Projects are added through the Eagle application process so the unit should log in to update the report as to number of people involved, value of materials and the organization benefitting from the project. 

RULES AND REGULATIONS of the BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA

Article X, Section 6, Clause 3 Silver Beaver Award

The Boy Scouts of America, acting through the National Court of Honor, may award the Silver Beaver for distinguished service to youth upon the following basis and procedure:

- a) Each local council may process their own annual allotment of Silver Beaver awards and shall send a list of Silver Beaver recipients presented each calendar year to the National Court of Honor no later than January 31 of the following year.
- b) The award is made for noteworthy service of exceptional character to youth by registered Scouters, Cub Scouters, Varsity Scouters, and Venturing leaders within the territory under the jurisdiction of a local council.
- c) As evidence of the award there shall be presented: a suitable certificate, duly authenticated by the Boy Scouts of America, pursuant to the action of the National Court of Honor; and a miniature Silver Beaver suspended by a blue, white, and blue ribbon to be worn around the neck.
- It shall be a general policy that no public announcements shall be made by the local council in advance of action by the National Court of Honor with reference to names presented for consideration.
- e) These awards shall be made to the recipients by the local council concerned in connection with its annual meeting or other public location.
- f) Each duly chartered local council shall be entitled to one nomination. Councils having more than 60 units shall be entitled to further nominations on the basis of one for each additional 60 units or fraction thereof in their territory, as of December 31 preceding the nomination, according to the records of the national office.
- g) Councils not using their full allotment in any year may accumulate the unused portion for use in any subsequent year.
- h) In extraordinary cases, the Silver Beaver Award may be made by the National Court of Honor to a Scouter upon the recommendation of the duly constituted Scouting authorities having supervision of one or more units of the Boy Scouts of America, located outside of the United States and not under the jurisdiction of a local council.
